

Military Finishing and Filing the Return Time Required: 30 minutes

Introduction

This lesson addresses special filing concerns of United States service members. The lesson covers how to determine where and when to file a federal tax return, who qualifies for a deadline extension, and who qualifies for special tax benefits.

Objectives

Identify the special tax filing concerns of members of the Armed Forces.

Describe the extensions to file that are available for members of the Armed Forces.

Determine the effect on taxes of being in a combat zone.

Identify the tax forgiveness provisions related to military or terrorist actions.

Key Terms

Combat Zone: Any area (1) the President of the United States designates by Executive Order as an area in which the U.S. Armed Forces are engaging or have engaged in combat, (2) the Department of Defense has certified for combat zone tax benefits due to its direct support of military operations, or (3) a Qualified Hazardous Duty Area established by statute where the service member receives imminent danger pay. Members of the U.S. Armed Forces who serve in a combat zone may exclude military pay from their taxable income.

Tax Forgiveness: For U.S. military personnel who die while serving in a combat zone or as a result of wounds, disease, or injury incurred while so serving, any unpaid tax liability is waived and any forgiven tax liability that has already been paid is refunded. The forgiveness applies to the tax year the death or injury occurred and the year prior.

Tax Liability (or total tax bill): The amount of tax after nonrefundable credits have been subtracted. Taxpayers meet (pay) their federal tax liability through withholding, estimated tax payments, and payments made with the income tax return.

General Filing Guidelines	Explain that members of the Armed Forces should send their returns to the IRS service center for where they currently live. Ask students when is the due date for a typical service member's tax return? Refer to Form 8822 for taxpayers who changed their mailing address during the year. Extensions	Review three ways for taxpayers to request an automatic six-month extension of time to file a return: • e-file Form 4868 • Pay all or part of the estimated income tax due using a credit or debit card • File a paper Form 4868 Emphasize that Form 4868 may give taxpayers an extension to file their return, but it does not extend the due date for paying taxes. 	Explain the automatic two-month extension requirements for taxpayers who live outside the United States and Puerto Rico.	
Notification to the IRS of Combat Zone Service	Review the definition of a combat zone and where they are located. Discuss ways taxpayers can notify the IRS that they are serving in a combat zone. 	Select an example in the topic to review with students.	
	Discuss rules for deferment of taxes for reservists and active-duty service members.	
	Review the special tax-forgiveness provisions that apply to service members and U.S. government employees who die while serving in a combat zone or from terrorist action.	
	Review the rules for filing a return for a decedent.
